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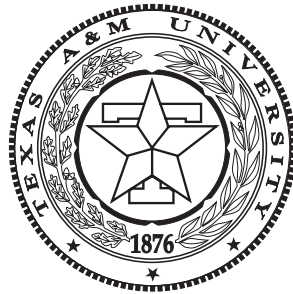
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### **Michael T. Flannery**

Michael T. Flannery is the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs and the Judge George Howard, Jr., Distinguished Professor of Law at the University of Arkansas at Little Rock William H. Bowen School of Law. He served as Associate Dean for Faculty Development from 2014 to 2016. He served as a Special Judge for the Twentieth Judicial District of the State of Arkansas from 2008 to 2011 and serves as a Legislative Expert Liaison for the Arkansas Bar Association’s Legislative Committee on Family Law. Professor Flannery teaches family law, decedents’ estates and trusts, prudent investing of trusts, law regarding the sexual exploitation of children, animal law, and sports law. Professor Flannery earned the Faculty Excellence Award for Research in 2006, 2010, and 2017 and earned the Faculty Excellence Award for Teaching in 2012. He also won the 2016 John M. DiPippa Scholarship Award for his case book, *The Sexual Exploitation of Children*. He was featured on National Public Radio as an “Agent of Change.” He is the author of fourteen books, two book chapters, fourteen law review articles, and twelve expert commentaries. Professor Flannery’s research has been cited by the Alabama Supreme Court, the Supreme Court of Iowa, the Supreme Court of Michigan, the Supreme Court of New Jersey, the Supreme Court of Texas, the Colorado Court of Appeals, the First District Court of Appeals of Florida, the Court of Appeals of Georgia, the Court of Appeals of Minnesota, and the Supreme Court of New York. Professor Flannery also speaks regularly on various panel symposia and is a member of numerous bar associations and legal organizations. He attended the Catholic University of America, Columbus School of Law.
