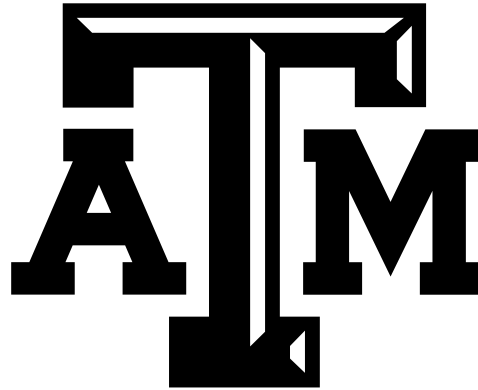

Jesse M. Cross

Revisiting the Congressional Review Act

Jesse M. Cross is an Associate Professor at the University of South Carolina School of Law, where he teaches Legislation, Health Law, Civil Procedure, and Conflict of Laws. During his time at South Carolina Law, his academic service has included roles as chair of the Association of American Law Schools Section on Legislation and Law of the Political Process and as a consultant to the Administrative Conference of the United States. Prior to entering academia, he served as Counsel in the Office of the Legislative Counsel to the U.S. House of Representatives, which drafts legislation for all committees and members of the U.S. House of Representatives. As counsel for the Office of the Legislative Counsel, he drafted legislation relating to Medicare, the Affordable Care Act, health information technology, and health care fraud, waste, and abuse.

Mark R. Kubisch

ESG, Public Pensions, and Compelled Speech

Mark R. Kubisch is an Associate Professor of Legal Research and Writing at Pepperdine University, Caruso School of Law. He received his law degree from the University of Notre Dame, where he served as Editor-in-Chief of the *Notre Dame Law Review* and earned the Colonel William J. Hoynes Award for having the best academic record in his class. Kubisch clerked for Judge Steven M. Colloton of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit during the 2015–2016 term. Prior to teaching at Pepperdine, Professor Kubisch was an associate at Jones Day, where he specialized in appellate litigation and critical motions practice.

Jillian Miller Purdue

Time to Heal: Trauma's Impact on Rape & Sexual Assault Statutes of Limitations

Jillian M. Purdue is an Associate in the Business and Corporate Transactions Group at Maynard Nexsen in Huntsville, Alabama. In May of 2023, she graduated from the University of Alabama School of Law. While at Alabama Law, she served as an Articles Editor for the *Alabama Law Review*. She also received awards for best paper in Legal Writing I & II and Alternative Dispute Resolution. Fredrick E. Vars is the Ira Drayton Pruitt, Sr. Professor of Law at the University of Alabama. He is the co-author of *Weapon of Choice*. Vars has also published in the *New England Journal of Medicine*, the *Yale Law Journal*, and many other top journals. His innovative suicide prevention proposal (“Donna’s Law”) has been adopted in three states.

Richard Delgado

The Consequences of Systemic Racism

Richard Delgado is a Distinguished Professor of Law at Seattle University. Delgado is among the most influential legal scholars in the United States, has received six Gustavus Myers Awards for Outstanding Books on Human Rights in North America, and has received a nomination for a Pulitzer Prize. He has written over twenty-eight books and nearly 200 articles. The Lindgren–Seltzer survey listed him as the number-one legal scholar in the United States in articles published in the top-ten and top-twenty law reviews. His work has been cited in important law reform cases by several higher courts, including the Supreme Court of Canada, and been reviewed in the *New York Times*, *The Nation*, the *Washington Post*, and the *Los Angeles Times*. Delgado received his J.D. from the University of California, Berkeley, School of Law.

Geneve Adams

Geneve Adams is a J.D. candidate at Texas A&M School of Law and will graduate in May 2024.
